## *From the Minister...*

Faxing seems so old fashioned these days; in the last few months, I have Skyped, IM'd, and even learned how to text on my phone (not while I drive though!). Most teens & tweens can text circles around me, no doubt. I marvel that there was a time in my twenties when I had refused to get a pager, like many of my peers, and even for a while, had consciously avoided owning a cell phone. Now of course, I have new concerns: when I learn that children as young as Celeste sometimes have their own cell phones and Face Book accounts, I resist the urge to equip children with so many technological devices and internet options – if they are saddled now, will they ever know a time when they can be truly solitary? I try to imagine a modern-day Thoreau, trudging off to his/her shack, suspending cell phone & internet access for a year ... could it be done? Also, I dread to consider how much time are we investing therein, individually & collectively, which could be have been better spent on genuine, real world pursuits. In short, at what cost comes our constant interconnectedness?

Others of course have noted, with varying degrees of alarm, that we are living in an age of massive information overload, which is a by-product. Some of the information of course is useful but we all know instances of people who swallow any information that they find on-line. In the way of example, I was researching the reported similarities between Osiris and Jesus – the number of possible web sites for those two keys is 1,120,000+ as of this moment; some of them affirm a connection, others vehemently deny it. None that I have yet encountered contain any evidence, merely statements that sound authoritative. Which is correct? Where are the scholars we dare trust? It is a tall task, sifting through so much proverbial hay, looking for that one needle.

This recent exercise – and, watching “Are You Smarter than a Fifth Grader,” prompts me yet again to review what I happen to regard as “the Truth.” What was taught several decades ago by earnest teachers may or may not still stand the test of time. Books I read decades ago, whose truths have been impressed upon me, may also or may not be accurate. Some of the information may be correct, but other may be superseded by more recent revelations. Heaven help me if I were obliged to take a Science or Geography test! Even history, that wonderfully interpretive field, in which I have long had a keen interest, is often revised, based on new information, recently uncovered – or released. What shall we then say about religious Truth? Much of what the world’s religions are built upon depends on certain specific incontrovertible truths – but of course, it is well known that there has always been much dispute (sometimes bloody) over which “facts” become accepted & celebrated. I suspect that any serious seeker after truth must periodically step back from the masses of conflicting information and peer into a mirror, perhaps into a scrapbook, and reminds him/her self, once again, what he/she knows and why, beginning with oneself. Which reminds me of an old adage: knowledge of things is

knowledge; knowledge of other people is wisdom; knowledge of oneself is enlightenment. The latter is something which cannot be found on-line; perhaps the “Truth” can never be successfully penned (let alone IM'd). “Revelation is unsealed” is a favorite saying amongst religious liberals – the older I get, the more I sense the wisdom of this; how very true this aphorism rings, but how very difficult at times to appreciate. In the meanwhile, let us exercise caution and, as the Buddha taught, strive to create a middle path as we navigate our journey through all the conflicting -- and competing -- “truths.”

## *From the Board President...*

The 2010-2011 liturgical church year is well underway. Once again, I encourage every ALUUC Member and Friend to become actively involved in our religious community by sharing in the work or activities of our committees, covenant groups, programs and fund raising opportunities. Participation enriches your relationships to the people and the local, regional and national organizations that comprise the Unitarian Universalist movement. As part of the attempt to extend my own interest (as I briefly reported in the prior newsletter), I attended the 49th General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association in Minneapolis, Minnesota June 23 – 27, 2010. In addition to the inspirational worship services, there were several plenary business meetings, in which several significant presentations and reports were provided by UUA leaders, UU ministers, lay leaders, and Minnesota dignitaries (including the Secretary of State Mark Ritchie, U.S. Congressman Keith Ellison, and U.S. Senator Al Franken). A major step was taken with the approval of a business resolution calling for a “Justice General Assembly” in Phoenix, Ariz., in 2012. The Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees had voted May 6 to ask the General Assembly to approve pulling the 2012 General Assembly out of Phoenix, Ariz. The measure came in response to the passage of a new state law cracking down on illegal immigration in Arizona, which many fear will lead to increased racial profiling and civil liberties violations. Delegates to the 2010 General Assembly in Minneapolis, Minn., June 23–27, would have to approve any such measure with a two-thirds majority to initiate a boycott. A considerable amount of debate ensued, especially in consideration of the financial impact of the original proposal that would have required the UUA and member congregations to raise \$615,000 in hotel cancellation fees and to raise at least another \$615,000 to support immigrants’ rights. Much to the surprise of the ALUUC Delegates and others, an alternative resolution had been crafted and became the subject of the final vote on the issue. A lot of questions remain for the UUA Board to address in scheduling and planning for this unique meeting in 2012. The preceding General Assembly in 2011 will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina, the 50th Anniversary of the UUA. It will undoubtedly be focused on this topic. The adopted resolution is inserted below.

Whereas the state of Arizona has recently enacted a law—SB 1070—that runs counter to our First Principle, affirming the worth and dignity of every person; and

Whereas we have been invited to enter into an historic partnership with Puente and

National Day Laborers Organizing Network (NDLON) to work for human rights and against racial profiling; and

Whereas the UUA Bylaws specify that the power to call and locate a General Assembly belongs solely to the UUA Board of Trustees;

Be it resolved, the Assembly hereby:

1) Calls on the UUA Board to gather Unitarian Universalists for the purposes of witnessing on immigration, racial and economic justice—a “Justice” General Assembly in which business is limited to the minimum required by our bylaws—in June 2012, to be held in Phoenix, AZ.

- 2) Calls on the UUA Administration to work with leaders in Arizona UU congregations to establish an Arizona immigration ministry to partner with other groups in Arizona working for immigration reform to strengthen those partnerships in preparation for our arrival in 2012.
- 3) Recognizing people with historically marginalized identities will be exposed to increased risk and inaccessibility, instructs the UUA Board to work in accountable relationship with Diverse Revolutionary Unitarian Universalist Multicultural Ministries (DRUUMM), Latina/o Unitarian Universalist Networking Association (LUUNA), EQUUAL ACCESS, Transgender Religious Professional Unitarian Universalists Together (TRUUST) and other stakeholders to identify measures that can be taken to increase safety and accessibility at the 2012 “Justice” GA.
- 4) Calls on the UUA Board to direct the economic impact of our presence in Phoenix toward our partners and allies as much as is feasible.
- 5) Calls on the UUA Board to provide the resources needed to build the capacity of Unitarian Universalists to stand in opposition to systemic racism in our congregations, local communities, and in our own lives.

The UUA website reports that “Immigration as a Moral Issue” was approved as the Congregational Study/Action Issue for 2010–2014. A new Issue is approved every other year. At the end of the 4-year process, the Commission on Social Witness drafts a resolution, called a Statement of Conscience, based on input from congregations. The UUA is midway through its review of this process on “Ethical Eating.” Delegates chose immigration this year over proposals on “Energy, Peace, and Justice,” “Ending Slavery,” “National Economic Reform,” and “Revitalizing American Democracy.” The General Assembly also endorsed a new Statement of Conscience on “Creating Peace.” An earlier version was referred back to the Commission on Social Witness at last year’s General Assembly, but was substantially revised to gain approval. Delegates also approved three of the five Actions of Immediate Witness, which are resolutions proposed by special petitions. One expressed opposition to Arizona SB 1070 and similar legislation targeting undocumented immigrants in other states and called for national immigration reform. Another called for environmental and economic justice on the Gulf Coast. A third urged that the federal Clean Energy Bill be expanded to include capping greenhouse gas emissions, controlling offshore oil drilling, and stopping mountaintop removal coal mining. Two others were proposed but failed to achieve the support of 2/3 of the delegates: one denouncing Israel’s blockade of Gaza; and the other calling for an immediate end to U.S. combat operations in Afghanistan and Pakistan

## *Senior Youth in the Spotlight*

Melinda S., a Junior at Springfield High School and member of our church's Senior High Youth Group, recently attended a Central Midwest District Youth Council Conference where she was elected to serve as one of five student representatives on the District Youth Steering Committee, an organization in CMWD that represents our District's youth. Melinda reports that "I was given the privilege of being elected as the DYSC secretary, whose tasks include: researching, taking notes, keeping records, and organizing. The elections took place for each available position with nominees being self-selected. I felt most drawn to the position of secretary and spoke before my fellow UU peers explaining why I thought I'd be right for the job. Two other potential youth gave speeches as well but when the votes were tallied, I was so honored to be selected! DYSC meets several times a year at each Youth Conference and through conference calls. Members on this Council also serve by attending Youth Conferences and confronting any conflicts that arise. Our adviser, Scott Wade, has also been an adult member of DYSC since last summer's elections and will continue to serve again this year. I'm excited about representing our Youth Group, ALUUC, and all teens in our District."



Ally P. reports that she was elected co-representative of BURT (the senior high program at MUUSA). She also noted that "the other co-rep is my best guy friend Owen. Our fellow "BURToids" had to nominate us then they all talked about us and then voted on us. There were 6 or 7 other people nominated and only 2 positions available. The point of being a rep of "BURT" is so that the voices of all members of camp are heard, even the 'crazy teenagers.' We are now members of the camp planning committee which means monthly conference calls, an in-person meeting in the fall in Chicago, going to camp a day early, and having 2 meetings a day while at camp. It's a big responsibility but it is one that I'm really looking forward to."

### **Wedding Officiants**

At present, ALUUC is fortunate to have the services of three lay wedding officiants: Buffy Lael, John Malan and Jack Kriel. These three individuals were approved by the Board of Directors to conduct weddings and same sex unions for non-members on behalf of our congregation, when the Minister was not available. Officiants serve for a two year term. Rev. Woulfe is interested in hearing from those members who desire to become a wedding officiant. The first step is to contact Rev. Woulfe and express your interest; following that, you will have a conversation with the Committee on Ministry; once you receive their recommendation, you will be considered by the board. ### **2010 Peace Camp Donations Needed**

Since 1995, Peace Camp has held a day camp for children teaching them conflict resolution skills, environment awareness, cultural appreciation, and much more. Campers participate in crafts, play games, listen to story tellers, and learn non-violent ways to work out their problems. Peace Camp brings in local artists, musicians, and mentors to visit the children. Nearly 60 children attend camp each year, with a staff of about 15 peace-trained counselors. Campers are aged 4 to 12 and come from all over Springfield, at no cost to their families. Thanks to generous donations from individuals and organizations Peace Camp has continued for 15 years. This year is no different; they are in need of donations to continue camp for the 16th year. Camp will be held August 2nd thru August 6th at Grace Lutheran Church.

Monetary donations are needed to cover camp costs (materials, insurance) and to provide lunch or snack for 60 campers. Other donations include arts and crafts materials or simply volunteering your time. 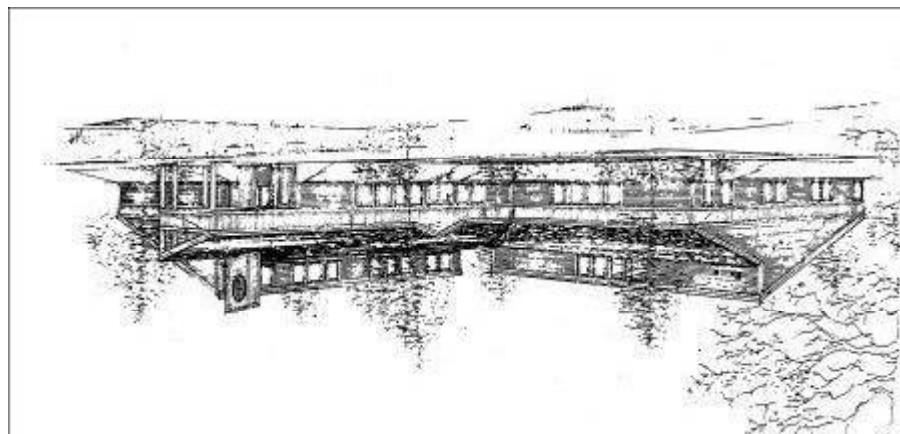
